How to save and publish pictures online - Advantages

Of course, there is also the option of **sharing** photos with your friends, loved ones, family and other users.



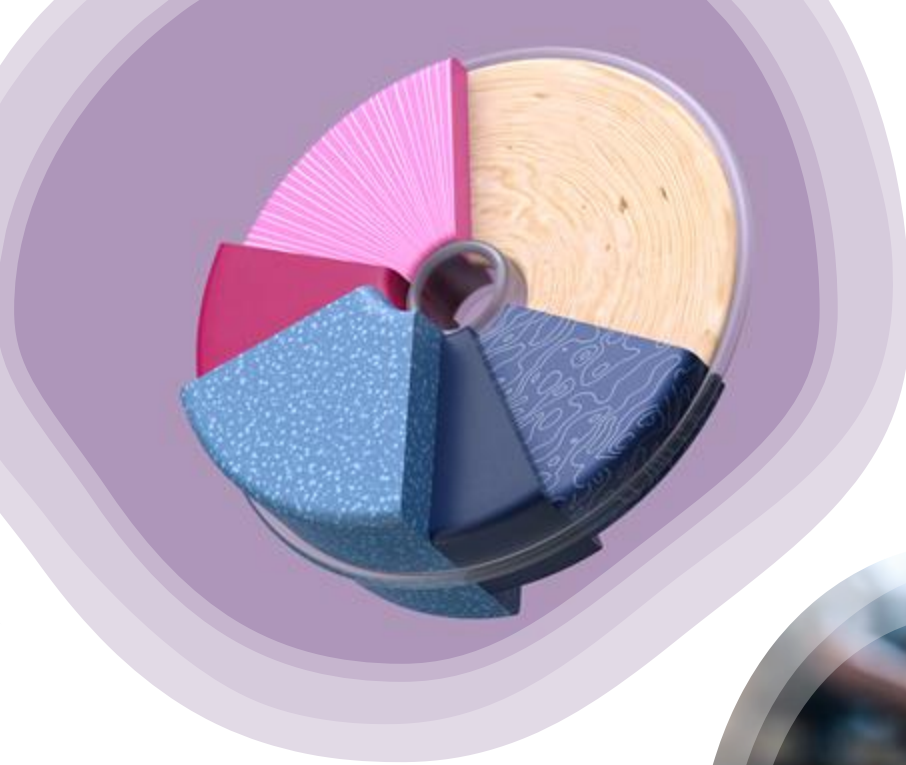
Or just **publishing them**

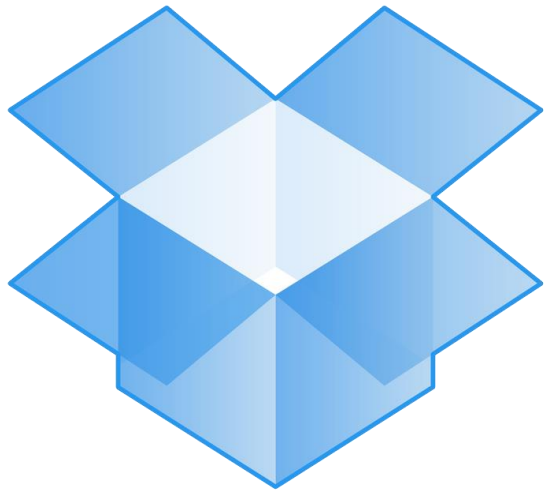
Make some memories!!



Disadvantages of local store

- the computer may break down and images **may be lost**
- when you change the computer, you will **need to transfer** the images to the new memory
- the phone's **memory fills up** quickly, especially if the images are of high resolution
- if you don't transfer the pictures from your old phone, they **stay on** that device
- **transferring** images to an SD card or disc is a practical but **long-term unprofitable solution**

The best places to save or publish pictures online (edit and make it better.)

- Dropbox (2GB free to 2TB DropboxPlus)
- iCloud (5GB for free...Apple, Win10, but not Android)
- OneDrive (5 GB for free, Microsoft for PC, mobile phones; for more space – log in to Microsoft Office 365)
- Google disk and Google Photos (for larger photos you should increase space on Google, you will have 15GB for free)
- Canva, Adobe portfolio
- Apps for creating a webpage or portfolio (wordpress, wix, webnode)
- All collaboration walls apps (Padlet, Miro, Jumbboard...)
- **Flickr**

FLICKR – let's play!!

Flickr for pictures cloud storage

- It offers a **wide variety of features to organize** your images online, and one of the best is that it **uses photo recognition software to analyze, tag, and sort them in order.**
- There are **options for downloading as well as sharing photos.** The visibility of images is adjustable - you can set them to be **public or private.**
- You can **access** the site from a computer, but also from a smartphone, as an application is **available for Android and iOS devices.**
- There is a **free version** of Flickr for users that is limited to **1000 photos.**
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- In order to be able to upload your images to Flickr, you must have your **own account**, which is opened for free with classic **registration and email verification.**
- If you need unlimited access, there is also a premium version with additional benefits.
